

CS -- MORNING INTRO -- CZECHOSLOVAK SITUATION

MUNICH, SEPT 8 (CNR) -- ANOTHER CZECHOSLOVAK NEWSPAPER IS EXPECTED TO REAPPEAR AGAIN TODAY FOLLOWING A DAY OF TALKS IN PRAGUE HELD BY SOVIET FIRST DEPUTY FOREIGN MINISTER VASILY KUZNETSOV AND CZECHOSLOVAK LEADERS.

OCCUPATION TROOPS CONTINUED TO WITHDRAW FROM NEWSPAPER OFFICES SATURDAY. THE PEOPLES PARTY NEWSPAPER, LIDOVA DEMOKRACIE, APPEARED FOR THE FIRST TIME IN ITS OLD FORMAT SINCE THE INVASION.

RADIO PRAGUE ANNOUNCED SATURDAY THAT THE SOCIALIST PARTY NEWSPAPER, SVOBODNE SLOVO, WOULD REAPPEAR TODAY.

KUZNETSOV MET CZECHOSLOVAK COMMUNIST PARTY LEADER ALEXANDER DUBCEK AND PREMIER OLDRICH CERNIK SATURDAY.

TASS SAID THE SOVIET VISITOR AND DUBCEK EXCHANGED OPINIONS ON CURRENT PROBLEMS OF MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THEIR TWO COUNTRIES, WHILE RADIO PRAGUE SAID HIS TALKS WITH CERNIK COVERED MUTUAL INTERESTS AND RELATIONS.

THE CZECHOSLOVAK PARTY PAPER RUDE PRAVO SAID THE PARTY PRESIDUM WAS READY FOR NEW TALKS WITH THE SOVIET UNION ON ENDING THE 17-DAY OCCUPATION OF THE COUNTRY.

BUT IN BRATISLAVA, SLOVAK PARTY LEADER GUSTAV HUSAK SAID THE OCCUPATION ARMIES WOULD REMAIN IN THE COUNTRY FOR SOME TIME YET.

RUDE PRAVO REPORTED FROM THE WEST GERMAN BORDER THAT CZECHOSLOVAK OFFICERS AND MEN ON GUARD THERE MAINTAINED THEY WERE CAPABLE OF GUARANTEEING FRONTIER SECURITY WITHOUT THE HELP OF FOREIGN TROOPS.

CZECHOSLOVAK TELEVISION WAS CRITICISED BY THE SOVIET-SUPPORTED RADIO STATION VLTAVA FOR CALLING WARSAW PACT FORCES FOREIGN ARMIES. VLTAVA SAID THIS INCITED UNDERGROUND SUBVERSIVE ACTIVITY.

VLTAVA ALSO DEMANDED THE REALIZATION OF WHAT IT CALLED THE PRACTICAL STEPS WHICH WERE THE SUBJECT OF THE MOSCOW TALKS.
